- **Required Documents :**

- Skills assessment results from a relevant Australian assessing authority.
- Evidence of work experience (e.g., employment letters, tax returns, or payslips).
- English language proficiency (e.g., IELTS, PTE, or TOEFL).
- Health and character documents (health check, police clearance certificate).
- Invitation to apply for a visa (if applying through a points-based system or under skilled migration).

Partner Visa (Subclass 820, 801)

- Evidence of your relationship with your Australian partner (e.g., joint bank accounts, joint property, photos, communication records).
- Your partner's Australian citizenship or permanent residency documents.
- Proof of your partner's willingness to sponsor you for the visa.
- Evidence of cohabitation or a genuine, ongoing relationship.

Business or Investor Visa (Subclass 188, 132)

- Proof of business experience and success (e.g., business registration, financial statements, tax returns).
- Evidence of investments (e.g., business plans, investment portfolios).
- Business references, if applicable.

Working Holiday Visa (Subclass 417, 462)

- Proof of sufficient funds for initial stay in Australia.
- Health and character documents.
- Passport with sufficient validity (at least 6 months).

Temporary Skill Shortage Visa (Subclass 482)

- Job offer from an approved sponsor in Australia.
- Evidence of qualifications and work experience related to the job offer.

- Health and character documents.
- Proof of English language proficiency.

3. Additional Documentation for Some Visas

- **Family members:** If applying as a family unit, you may need to provide the identification and relationship documents for each family member included in the application.
- **Specialist Visas:** If applying for a specific visa like a **temporary graduate visa** (Subclass 485) or **distinguished talent visa**, you may need to provide additional specialized documentation (e.g., evidence of exceptional talent or achievements in your field).
